IPMEC Preliminary Program (July 2006)

You are invited to be a part of an international effort to change the public attitude towards the ocean and to actively protect this ecosystem that keeps our world healthy. If the ocean isn't healthy, people are in jeopardy. Our kids deserve to be given a healthy legacy.

Pressures from a rapidly growing world population are increasing at an exponential rate. From CO₂ concentrations that accelerate global climate change to global depletion of fishery stocks, the problems are unprecedented and will require innovative solutions. A worldwide network of educators who focus on and are prepared to share knowledge and resources to solve these problems is essential.

Designing a network of educators for sustainable oceans was the goal of the One Ocean Marine Forum held in Hawaii in July 2005.

The International Pacific Marine Educators Conference (IPMEC) is an outcome of the Forum and aims to further the establishment of a worldwide network of marine educators by piloting a regional network for the Pacific. Approximately 100 marine educators will gather January 15 to 19, 2007, at the University of the South Pacific in Suva, Fiji, to share resources and build a network aimed at ensuring the health of the Pacific Ocean and the communities who depend upon it.


Field Trips [Optional]

Having to Fiji

Most visitors to Fiji
will fly into Nadi
(pronounced Nandi).
As the conference is
in Suva, you will need to

drive, bus or fly to Suva. Flight time to Fiji from Los Angeles is 10 hours (current estimate US\$1,000), from Auckland 3 hours (current estimate NZ\$570), from Sydney 3 hours 50 minutes (current estimate A\$500).

Fiji enjoys an ideal South Sea tropical climate but seldom reaches above 35°C (96°F). Trade winds from the east southeast bring year long cooling breezes late afternoon and early evening. The season for tropical rain is from December through February coinciding with Fiji's warmest summer months.

The Fiji Islands Visitor's Bureau web site at www.bulafiji.com/ is an excellent source of information for potential travellers. This web site provides details of visa and passport requirements and other elements of travel to Fiji plus useful information about clothing to bring, health and safety, electricity, postal services, internet services, currency and even tipping.
